U.S. NEWS & WORLD REPORT RANKS THE WILLIAMSPORT HOME AMONG BEST IN PA

In November, The Williamsport Home was named a "Best Nursing Home" for 2024 by U.S. News & World Report. The Williamsport Home earned this status by achieving a rating of "High Performing," the highest possible rating, for both Short-Term Rehabilitation and Long-Term Care.

US News & World Report gives the designation of Best Nursing Home only to those that satisfy U.S. News' assessment of consistent performance in quality measures. For the 2024 edition, U.S. News rated more than 15,000 nursing homes across the US using a variety of quality measures including staffing levels, infection rates, health inspection reports, use of antipsychotic drugs, and success in preventing ER and hospital visits.

"U.S. News' Best Nursing Homes ratings give patients, senior residents, their families and caregivers an objective assessment of quality, to help them choose the facility that best fits their individual needs," said Ben Harder, chief of health analysis and managing editor at U.S. News. "Nursing homes that have earned the recognition of U.S. News have a track record of achieving better outcomes for patients and residents, and maximizing the amount of care they receive from nurses and other staff."

UNDERSTANDING YOUR SKILLED NURSING Medicare Benefits

If your doctor or hospital team has recommended that you consider utilizing a Skilled Nursing Facility (SNF), you may have questions about next steps or what benefits you are eligible for under Medicare. We put together the following Frequently Asked Questions about Medicare benefits for Skilled Nursing, based on the questions our staff are asked regularly at The Williamsport Home. We hope these answers will help you better understand your benefits.



WHAT SNF BENEFITS DO I HAVE UNDER MEDICARE?

Under your Medicare A benefit, you have up to 100 days of coverage during each benefit period. A new benefit period is one in which you have not used your SNF benefits for 60 days or more. The length of your stay (up to the 100 days) is determined by your individual needs while at the SNF. Wound care, receiving IV antibiotics, and physical, occupational, or speech therapy are some of the services that are covered by the Medicare A benefit.



HOW DOES MY BENEFIT PERIOD BEGIN?

Your benefit period begins after a 3-night inpatient stay at an acute hospital. "Observation" days do not count toward your 3-night stay. After 3 nights, if the medical team recommends a post-acute stay, a referral will be made to a SNF of your choice and once accepted, you will be transferred to the facility, where your benefit period will begin.



WHAT DOES MEDICARE COVER AT THE SKILLED NURSING AND REHAB CENTER?

Medicare covers a semi-private room, meals, skilled nursing care, medications, medical supplies, social services, dietary counseling, and physician-ordered therapies.



DO I HAVE ANY CO-PAYS OR OUT-OF-POCKET EXPENSES?

Medicare benefits pay up to your first 20 days in full during your qualified stay. If you are still receiving therapies or treatment after day 20, there is a \$200/day co-pay for days 21-100. Supplemental insurance and/or Medicaid often covers this portion, however if you do not have either, the co-pay is paid to the SNF directly out-of-pocket.



IF I GO HOME FROM THE SNF AND DECLINE 2 WEEKS LATER, DO I HAVE TO GO BACK TO THE HOSPITAL FOR 3 MORE NIGHTS?

NO. If you haven't exhausted your 100 benefit days when discharging from the SNF, Medicare has a 30-day window that allows you to re-admit to continue with rehabilitation under your original benefit period. Often patients feel they are ready to go home and later realize they may need a little more time in therapy.
